# Foundation Takes Action to Affect Managed Care Issues

AHTF launches "G.R.A.B. the Future" grant initiative

Last year, the American Hand Therapy Foundation
(AHTF) sent an extensive questionnaire to all Certified
Hand Therapists and experienced non-certified
Hand Therapists specializing in hand/upper extremity
problems. The purpose of this survey was to determine the most pressing professional needs of this group of highly skilled and specialized therapists to ensure that AHTF's funds are directed where they are most needed. Results from this survey found that nearly
100% of the respondents focused on managed care issues in one way or another. A majority of the respondents

Based on the clearly defined questionnaire responses, the question for the Foundation became, "How best can

AHTF help therapists positively influence managed care through research endeavors and thereby improve/enhance patient treatment?" Knowing how to affect change is fundamental to success. A key concept is recognizing that the war on managed care is being fought in the research arena with cold hard data as its ammunition. While avenues for bringing about change do exist, these avenues are open only to those groups that can substantiate their premises with hard core research data.

Hand Therapy is so specialized that other groups, such as our parent organizations, are not in a position to provide the data needed to substantiate hand therapy specialty practice. In the big scheme, however, hand therapy research data can help these other groups because hand therapy is more easily measured than many other therapy fields.

Research is the nucleus of the Foundation's mission. AHTF works to generate funds to support

needed research projects that are carried out by independent researchers.

In direct response to its 1998 survey, the Foundation is setting up grants that specifically deal with the survey's most frequently identified areas of need. These include, but are not limited to, efficacy of hand therapy treatment and definition of length of treatment duration as related to specific diagnostic categories. Working on the premise of "Create a grant and

they (researchers) will come", AHTF's "GRAB the Future" project allows participation by individuals, groups, and corporations. To support the level of studies needed, grant amounts need to be a minimum of \$10,000 per grant. "Adopt a grant" and "Build a grant" mechanisms are available to encourage a wide range of participation. For

example, corporation "X" may "Adopt a grant" by contributing \$10,000 or more, while smaller groups or individuals may combine assets to "Build a grant".

Contributors have the option of naming the grants they underwrite, i.e., "The 'X' Company Grant for Defining Optimal

Treatment Duration for 'z' Diagnostic Category". Full financial reporting on use of grant funds will be part of every grant.

Data generated from "GRAB the Future" grants will be used by individuals and groups to define treatment parameters that prove the efficacy of hand/upper extremity intervention both (continued page 2)

at the grass roots and national levels. AHTF's "GRAB the Future" initiative has long range benefits for all those involved in the hand/upper extremity rehabilitation arena.



Therapists, clinics, vendors, and related organizations are inextricably linked in that, what positively affects one, affects the others! We must work together to secure our future by proving the productiveness of hand therapy and enhancing the quality of care we provide our patients.
